Senator Hart appeared here Wednesday answering questions directed him by a panel consisting of Dr. Prownell, Ed Backus, All Hansen, and Joe Franks on some of the main senstorial campaign issues.

Senator hart stated that he strongly backs the Kennedy, Johnson program and he feels that it is the test policy for Michigan and the United States.

Senator Hart has been in politics since 1949 when he was appointed Corporation and Security Commissioner, later teing named director of the Michigan office of Peace Statilization. He then became US district for Eastern attorney Michigan and then legal advisor to Governor Williams.

An expert on a wide range of Australian issues; Mr. Pirman's address was entitled "Australia - An Asian Nation?" The "land down under", because of its location and traditional Pritish ties, has often been ignored by Americans studying world affairs. 
